### WELCOME

News from the Trust – a termly round up of achievements, key dates and partnership working supported by CSoC (the Trust).

The Trust is a registered charity established in 1703 to provide schooling with a Christian ethos for poor children in Cambridge. Today, the charity provides facilities and targeted support to four Church of England primary schools in Cambridge - St Luke's, St Paul's, St Philip's and Park Street. The schools are funded and run by Cambridgeshire Local Authority, with foundation governance provided by the Diocese of Ely. The Trust also provides additional targeted funding for specific school projects, along with making other relevant grants to the wider community of Cambridge. There are currently 15 volunteer Trustees who oversee the running of the Trust; the day-to-day operations are carried out by the Director (Isobel Rawlinson) and support staff. ### **Jesus Lane Sunday School**

In 1827, a group of Cambridge University undergraduates had the idea to open a Sunday School to help disadvantaged children in the then rapidly growing parish of St Andrew, Barnwell. They had been inspired to put their faith into action and do something of practical good for the people of Cambridge by the preaching of Rev. Charles Simeon, Vicar of Holy Trinity and a leading Evangelical of the time. The school first opened in the Friends Meeting House on Jesus Lane and became known as the

Jesus Lane Sunday School. Hundreds of undergraduates taught at the school over the years it ran. It has been called 'the most famous of all Sunday schools' and its legacy endures through the establishment of the Jesus Lane Sunday School Endowment Fund, now administered by the Church Schools of Cambridge. The Fund annually provides grants to churches in the two Cambridge deaneries to support their work with children. Applications for this year's grant award are currently being invited from all eligible churches, for submission to the Trust by 16 April (email: admin@csoc.org.uk) It is wonderful to think that what began as a student initiative nearly two centuries ago continues to live on through the Fund, still helping churches to support children in Cambridge!
